COVID-19 Dedicated Wards

HGH – 5 West (24 Patients) JH – F5 (21 Patients) JH – E2 (14 Patients)

- NEW JH has 2 COVID-dedicated wards: E2 (half the unit) and F5
 - o Total 3 COVID-dedicated wards at HHS
 - 5West at HGH (covered by GIM team)
 - F5 and E2 at JH (covered by GIM and Hospitalists)

COVID-19 Dedicated ICUs

HGH – ICU South (8 Patients) JH – Level 1 ICU (9 Patients)

- **NEW** JH now has a COVID-dedicated ICU: Level 1 (10 beds)
 - o Total 2 COVID-dedicated ICUs at HHS
 - ICU South at HGH (covered by intensivists)
 - Level 1 ICU at JH (covered by intensivists)

Critical Care Support (Updates)

- ICU South continues to have an on-site intensivist at night who will respond to Code Blue calls
- JH ICU continues to have a PCB physician at night who will respond to Code Blue calls

Vaccination Updates

NEW

Vaccine Distribution

HHS following provincial direction – constantly evolving and having to adapt continuously

- Determined that residents and workers in LTC and high risk retirement homes deemed priority
- Accelerate immunization of LTC and RH residents across Ontario (may include some ALC patients / those about to go into LTC facilities)
- Protect second doses by extending intervals:
 - Pfizer: LTC / RH residents 21 27 days, for all others (including healthcare workers) extend to 35 42 days
 - Moderna: maintain at 28 day interval
- Province may reallocate doses across Ontario as needed to meet needs

Vaccine Distribution So Far...

- Hospital 1st Doses (HHS + SJHH) 6200
- Hospital 2nd Doses (HHS + SJHH) 250
- LTC 1st Doses 4200
- LTC 2nd Doses 1700
- Paramedics / Other 1st Doses 1200
- Paramedics / Other 2nd Doses 250

What's Next For HHS And What We Need From You:

- Vaccination Clinic will contact anyone with booked appointments
 - First call to cancel existing appointments
 - Second call to confirm rebooking (timing TBD)
- All first doses to hospital HCW are currently paused
- Second doses (as of Tuesday, January 26th) will be administered 35 to 42 days after first dose
- HCW will receive the vaccine in sequenced order based on the provincial document "Guidance for Prioritizing HCW's for COVID 19 Vaccine"
- While first doses are paused, HHS reviewing sequencing groups to ensure that everyone who still requires 1st dose (those at greatest risk), get it as soon as it becomes available and will ensure that everyone has self-identified their sequencing appropriately
- Please review FAQ's and revised Sequencing Group Document
- Goal remains to vaccinate everyone at HHS who wishes to receive it timing based on supply


- Health Canada, National Advisory Committee on Immunization, WHO and CDC all say safe to extend period between the two doses of vaccine
- NACI advises that while 2nd dose should be given according to approved schedule if possible. But may delay 2nd dose for logistic/epidemiological reasons for up to 42 days
- Should get same immune response at 42 days than at 21-28 days (21 days was shortest possible period between 2 doses)

We recognize that there is a lot of disappointment and stress associated with the provincial government's edict to save all vaccine doses for long term care, including what we had in reserve for second doses for our front line staff. The recent uncertainty around vaccine delivery nationally has compounded this. While we all recognize that long term care is clearly a priority in Ontario, we also appreciate that our frontline staff continues to be at risk daily owing to this pause in vaccines. Please be assured that we are advocating on your behalf at the provincial tables to rectify this situation. (We also are aware that many of you know colleagues in other places who have received vaccine and there appears to be variation and timing differences in application of the process). We are also looking for answers to these issues.

We are striving to get second vaccine doses as quickly as possible, although an extended time frame out from 21 days to 35-42 days is also an edict from the provincial government. While there is not a lot of evidence here yet, the CDC currently recommends up to 42 days for the second dose. Please see these links to two articles: The first (NEJM) shows the amount of protection from one dose of vaccine: the second looks at the current evidence for delaying the second dose up to 42 days as is currently recommended

Highlights from Town Hall (Thursday January 28th):

Pandemic Response Planning (Presented by Sharon Pierson)

- Provincial / Regional Overview
 - o Planning as unified health system
 - Maintaining 15% surge capacity & 1/3 of unoccupied critical care capacity for patients from elsewhere
 - o Regional transfers

- Managing more and ongoing outbreaks (JH, HGH, WLMH, SHF)
- Responding to provincial legislation to support other hospitals, LTC and RH in crisis while balancing internal staffing
- Grace Villa continuing to stabilize, most HHS staff have returned

Epidemiology Update (Presented by Dr. Dominik Mertz)

- Provincially, seem to be past the "holiday peak" and are currently where we were prior to holidays (around the start of December) in terms of rate of infection
- Hospital admissions are overall decreasing across the province and it's possible we are past
 the peak of admissions, however ICU's are currently at peak, perhaps not necessarily
 increasing
- Hamilton is starting to see trend of COVID-19 diagnosis decrease (lockdown working)
- New modeling will be coming from Provincial Government on January 28th which Dr. Mertz will speak to during next week's Town Hall
